THE SEAXE CLUB - ANNUAL REVIEW 2019

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT:

"At this time of the year, my thoughts normally turn to all the matters that affect our everyday life-- the weather, family, the home, health and the wider future among many other items--this year however, there is something else to stretch the mind, namely the future of cricket and in particular, success at Middlesex Cricket.

As Seaxe members you will have been very aware of all the ups and downs and disappointments but I hope that you will also have been pleased to see that so many of our players have extended their contracts with us. I have spoken to Gus and Stuart about the "close" season activities and they are very pleased with the enthusiasm shown by the players. In addition, we have the real added benefit of the England World Cup winning captain committing to leading the T20 side in what we all hope will be a successful campaign.

So much for the cricket at the top level which will also be covered by others in this edition, let us not forget the amazing progress made by our up-and-coming young players, by the disability squads, by the various age groups and by women's cricket which is really establishing itself. To be the Chairman of Middlesex Cricket is a great honour but also requires significant commitment in time and as the areas that I have described above grow in importance. It is also necessary that the Board apportions them the necessary time and resource.

It is for this reason that I proposed to the Seaxe committee that we revert back to the format where the chair of Seaxe was a stand-alone role. They agreed, and I am delighted to say, that Glen Birkwood has agreed to take on the position, depending, of course on ratification at the AGM. I shall remain on the committee and continue to ensure that the close relationship developed between other parts of Middlesex Cricket and Seaxe continue to flourish.

Now let me take a moment to reflect on our game over the last 3/4 years:

- the governing body (ECB) has got much more direct involvement with First Class Counties.
- the pressure from broadcasters has required a change in the approach to the game.
- the majority of First Class Counties could NOT survive without broadcast revenues.
- professional sport has had more money invested in it than ever before.
- professional cricketers have more opportunities available to them to play around the world.
- the differentials in pay across the game are enormous.
- injury rates and attrition rates among players have increased significantly.
- new competitions abound.

I have just highlighted some of the key issues so let's think what that means to county cricket

- · fewer games at the "proper " time of the season.
- more demands on players.
- · perceived diminution of value of county championship.
- financial pressures on counties.
- difficulties for some players in finding a career pathway.

At Middlesex Cricket we have faced all of these issues and continue to do so. However, we have in place a process which we believe will help and some of the following comments might help reinforce this view.

- a. the ECB have recognised the validity of the value of First Class Counties and the county championship and increased the money available.
- b. at Lord's we have a wonderful ground and the partnership with the MCC is stronger than ever
- c. 2020 will be Stuart Law's first full season with us and he and the players have made it clear that they want to prove that they are worthy of your support.
- d. our structure at all levels is strong and resilient.
- e. We also have in Seaxe (the club within a club) a group of people who care passionately about the game and who show that in tangible form with their support for young players.

I hope that you will give Glen your support in his role and continue, as always, to challenge me and the Board to deliver what you as Middlesex members want..... success on and off the field.

Let us look forward to a great season, we know that the county game is the

bedrock of cricket and now that there is now a dawning realisation of that among those of influence who doubted that...the future is looking distinctly brighter "

TREASURER'S REPORT:

This is my final report before I hand over the reins to our new Treasurer Stephen Lockwood, subject to ratification. The balance sheet remains very positive with our assets almost entirely vested in the various bank accounts. Total assets of £28,479 show an increase from last year of just under £2k. I will provide some comments below about the significant transactions during the year.

INCOME:

Members` Subscriptions: Revenues decreased slightly year on year by £86 to £3,894. Perhaps this is an incentive to have a recruitment drive for new members. With that in mind, we are preparing a new membership leaflet that will be available for the start of the new season in April.

The Seaxe Lottery (100 Club): Once again, I am very grateful to all of our wonderful members who participated most generously in the Lottery (100 Club). I have tried to minimise the `100 Club` terminology as we do have some 290 numbers in issue, although we have to retain the name as the bank account is detailed as such. Using the rules laid down though our licence with Westminster Council, prizes totalling $\mathfrak{L}1,209$ (35% of income) were paid out from income of $\mathfrak{L}3,457$ allowing us to retain $\mathfrak{L}2,248$ (65%). Renewals for 2020 appear positive as I write and we would hope to retain a similar sum at the end of 2020.

Teas in the Seaxe Box: Due to the World Cup, the box was not so available as in previous years, although Brian Cahill and his team still managed to generate revenues of $\mathfrak{L}510$ (2018 $\mathfrak{L}580$) from sales of tea, coffee and cakes. On behalf of the Seaxe members, I would like to thank Brian and team for their excellent work.

50th **Anniversary Memorabilia:** You will recollect that through an initiative by Keith Macrae a range of logoed ties, glasses, pens and shirts was commissioned in 2018 and the year-end revealed that stock valued at £926 was held. During 2019 we tried to sell off that stock and managed to generate net income of £251. However, we were left with a net stock value of £675 (£926-£251) and, after deliberation, the Committee decided that the stock balance should be written off. We do still hold that stock as specified in the notes to the accounts and will continue to try to sell it in the coming year. Any income will be a bonus.

Elaine Knight Donations: The Club received donations of £610 in memory of our much loved Secretary. The Committee is considering the purchase of a new award to be presented in April. More details will follow.

Christmas Lunch: The format for the Lunch was changed from a buffet to a slightly more formal `sit down` lunch, once again held in the Tavern and it proved to be a most enjoyable occasion expertly organised by Steve Baldwin. Income was £1,689 and expenditure £1,724. The small loss of £35 was attributed to payment of a gratuity to the Tavern staff who, as usual, looked after us extremely well.

Donations Received: Our membership has again been extremely generous donating £4,193 (2018 - £4,052). We thank everyone for their kindness in helping us to pursue our goal of supporting cricket within the County.

Bursary Donations: We were delighted to receive another donation from the Worshipful Company of Chartered Accountants of £1,000. We were requested to `earmark` the funds for Bursary Donations. We spent £472 on one specific bursary and a further £5k for a bursary to the Middlesex Cricket Board for All Stars Cricket.

Interest Received: We received £38 (2018 £44) by way of interest from the bank. Balances were slightly lower this year.

EXPENDITURE:

Seaxe News: The cost was £2,065 (2018 - £1,650) for the three editions. The reasons for the increase were: Each publication was larger than previously seen due to (a) much of the AGM published material being included in the first issue, and (b) our new editor, Glen Birkwood, generating many interesting articles and copy. I am sure you would wish me to thank Glen for his hard work. Once again, Middlesex CCC very kindly helped us out with the postage, for which we are very grateful.

Administration Expenses: £412 (2017 - £224). Once again, the members of your Committee generously claimed little of the expenditure incurred during the year. I have detailed the expenditure in note 7 to the accounts. The major spend was £289 for renewal of the web-site domain.

50th Anniversary Memorabilia: Stock write off of £926 as detailed above.

Race Night: This is an unusual entry of £15 and represents a refund, hence it is shown as a minus figure in the expenditure listing. Three generous members kindly decided not to present their refund cheques of £5 each from 2018 and it was easier for me to reveal those refunds in this way in the accounts.

Social Events: The hospitality cost of the AGM and Awards Evening was £59 and £304 (2018 - £89 & £230). We did not have a claim from Elaine Knight in respect of

the drinks she bought for the Box Reception on 22^{nd} July 2018 due to her illness. It was inappropriate to chase so we settled on a sum of £100 which we credited to her account before she passed away. Once again, we held a Reception in the Middlesex Room on 23rd September where the committee agreed to allow each member in attendance a `free` drink and this cost the Club £149 (2018 - £231). Total `social` expenditure was £613.

Player of the Year Awards and Trophies: Each year we have our awards engraved and also buy small trophies for the recipients to keep, and this cost £359 this year. In addition, in 2019, we bought and engraved a new trophy for the `Women`s Player of the Year` for £121 which was presented for the first time. It will be remembered that we also award bottles of Champagne to Middlesex players who achieve certain milestones and the bubbly cost £68 for their awards from 2018, presented in 2019.

Awards: Each year we make provision for the cost of the awards which will be presented the following year. We have provided £250 and £750 for those awards in 2020. For some years we have had difficulty with the awards as a number of vouchers have not been claimed by the winners. To simplify matters in 2019, we bought the winners retail vouchers from a national scheme with no stipulation as to how they might be spent.

Middlesex Colts Association: MCA did not need our help in 2019.

All Stars Cricket: We presented a further bursary of £5k to the Middlesex Cricket Board for the All Stars Cricket scheme.

Seaxe Bursaries: We were pleased to be able present one bursary in the year. Les Rowland is to be thanked for his excellent work and we hope that the beneficiary benefits as he progresses in his cricketing career.

SUMMARY: A surplus for the year of £1,939 (2018 – deficit £4,987) resulted generating an increase in the net assets of the Club.

In conclusion, I would like to offer my grateful thanks to Michael Wilson, our Independent Checker, for giving his time and expertise to the Club.

A REMINDER OF THE MCC DRESS CODE APPLICABLE TO MEMBERS STANDS AND THE BOXES

It is probably easier to list that which is NOT allowed:

Gentlemen's shirts which do not have a collar (unless worn by under 16's), including crew-neck shirts (polo shirts are acceptable), T-shirts or singlets. Torn ripped or unclean clothing. Football, running, athletic, cycling, tennis or other shorts worn for playing sport. Tracksuits, garments in military camouflage colours.

Ladies bikini tops or tops/dresses showing bare midriff.

All - beachwear, beach style flip flop shoes, bare feet, bare torsos and anyone wearing dilapidated or offensive garments of any kind will not be permitted under any circumstances.

Notwithstanding the dress standards outlined above, the MCC reserves the right to refuse entry to any person considered unsuitably attired.

These are the rules set by the MCC not the Seaxe Club or Middlesex and we must abide by them.

BEHIND THE SCENES WITH SAM PRICE

I have been on board at Middlesex for a little over two years now, having taken up the role as Communications Executive at the beginning of 2018, working under Steven Fletcher in the Media/Marketing department.

I joined up with Middlesex with a background in marketing, having spent a year with a marketing agency whilst also operating my website, which focussed on trends in the sporting industry from a media perspective.

One of my primary roles at Middlesex is to run our many social media channels, including Facebook, Twitter, Instagram



& YouTube. Being in my mid-twenties, social media is a phenomenon which I have grown up alongside, meaning I am well accustomed to spending my life scrolling through timelines (often hours at a time). This is something which whilst my parents may not have been proud of at the time, has left me well equipped for this role at the very least!

I take great pride in this role, and one of my primary objectives upon arriving at Middlesex was to bring the club into the 21st century online, giving our fans instant access to any news and updates the club has. Now more than ever, I believe supporters are eager to feel as close to a club and its players as possible. Social media provides us with an opportunity to satisfy this desire, and this is a large part of why I feel it is so important to focus on.

We now have over 195,000 followers across our primary social media platforms and were the fastest growing club during the 2019 season. In real terms, this means we are connecting with more people who are interested with Middlesex, as well as potential new fans of the club, which can mean a great deal to the club in terms of revenue in the long term.

During the season, I spend a lot of my time with the players and backroom staff in the pre-match build-up and during matches, whether that's here at Lord's, or away around the country. One of the more nerve-racking moments upon arriving in 2018 was meeting them all for the first time, not really knowing what to expect! I'm pleased to confirm, however, that Middlesex are blessed with a great group of professionals – and I really had nothing to worry about whatsoever!

My role during the season does evolve somewhat, constantly fluctuating between part-time photographer, graphic designer, videographer and often even chair-unfolder at out-grounds. Primarily however, I spend the majority of my time on matchdays keeping our social media channels and website up to date, providing match updates as quickly and succinctly as possible – whilst running around the ground trying to grab as much exclusive content as I can. On days where Middlesex are winning in particular, I believe this to be one of the best jobs in the world.

I also help to manage our other online functions, such as the club website. My job includes keeping the website up to date at all times, not only with the latest news that we want to publicise, but also with our matchday live-streams, latest events & exclusive members content.

The website is ever evolving, and we were proud to launch a brand-new membership portal at the end of 2019, which we are confident will provide members instant access to all their information regarding their membership, as well as exclusive membership offers and content.

Our live stream also launched on our website in the time since I have joined the club. This has added another dimension to our online offering to fans, and we are all excited by the number of cricket lovers who are tuning in online throughout the season to watch us play.

We're looking forward to the 2020 season already, and we will be looking to continue to improve our online offering again this year!

LUKE HOLLMAN'S REPORT ON THE ENGLAND U19'S TRIP TO THE W/INDIES DECEMBER 2019

Having completed my A levels in June, it was a relief to finally be able to concentrate solely on cricket. The priority focus was a Middlesex professional contract and after an enjoyable season, especially at Club level, I was delighted when I found out that I was to be offered one. It was around this time that David Graveney contacted me to tell me that I had been recalled to the England U19's squad along with Blake Cullen who had been leading the attack for U19's during the summer in a tough series against India and Bangladesh.

So instead of resting, I began weekly trips to Loughborough, working on my fitness until the Middlesex winter training season started in November. Following more regular training sessions ahead of departure, including a 3 day outward bound trip to the Lake District, the Young Lions met up at Gatwick airport late November to travel out for a one month tour of Antiqua.

We had 2 warm up matches at the beginning of December against an Antigua XI, followed by 3 matches each against West Indies and Sri Lanka followed by a final. The games were scheduled at Sir Viv Richards Stadium and the Coolidge Cricket Ground. Blake and I both picked up a wicket in the first warm up game but did not bat in a comfortable 7 wicket win. In the 2nd game Blake was rested and it was an even more straightforward win by 10 wickets, bowling out the opposition for 81. I had figures of 6-2-15-1.

Because of visa issues, the Sri Lankans arrived late so the Tri Nations schedule had to be hastily rearranged. Before the first match at the Sir Viv, we paid tribute to Bob Willis, led by David Graveney. I was rested but Blake was recalled and opened the

as were both playing. Unfortunately in piecing together 149-4, neither of us batted and felt helpless being unable to give the innings its necessary impetus. A wicket from Blake, 4 wicketless overs from me, and Sri Lanka romped home by 27 runs DLS. A very frustrating day, but hopefully a proper opportunity would come in the next match against the W Indies.

Unfortunately an uncertain batting response saw us come up 36 runs shy although Blake batted well, supporting Kasey Aldridge (Somerset) in a 32 run partnership for the 9th wicket. A disappointing start but I was raring to go for the 2nd match 2 days later - same oppo, same ground. This time it was

the W Indies who failed to chase what was a paltry total! Game 3 was against Sri Lanka and Blake and I were delighted

Blake retained his place (there was now a clear rota for the 3 main seamers - 2 games on 1 off). Blake 3 wickets and Aldridge 6 wickets blew the W Indies batting away for just 116 and despite losing 4 wickets the total was passed in the 40th over. Unless they reached the final, the opportunity to play them and repeat my century innings from 2016 had gone! The next match was another low scoring

game but I did finally get in to bat scoring the winning runs. Earlier 6 overs bowling saw some strong appeals and balls frustratingly not quite going to hand. The final round robin game against Sri Lanka was a dead rubber as they had since beaten W Indies again but I was pleased to be picked and delighted to come in at number 5. We were 153-3 with just over 12 overs to go. I was pleased with how I was able to support Jordan Cox and bring out his positive play. I was delighted for him as he scored the only 100 of the tour. When I was out to an extraordinary caught and bowled, we were 194-4. Finally we had a total to put the opposition under pressure. Blake picked up an early wicket and I got a brace in what was surely the best performance of the tour and a final to look forward to.



Blake retained his place but I was surprisingly and disappointingly dropped. The batting reverted to its early tournament form running out 66 run losers despite Blake's 3 wickets and a strong opening seam display. It was a great honour to meet Sir Curtly Ambrose who handed out the medals.

Her 2019 County season started with a bang, scoring 138 against Worcestershire in only the second Championship match of the season. The rest of her 50 over campaign included three half centuries and an unbeaten 114 against Wales. In a Ben Stokes-esque

Lucy is the epitome of committment, and evidence of how this pays off. Rarely missing an opportunity to train or get match time, both with the County and away from the Middlesex programme. Her 2019 season saw her score a total of 299 runs with her highest score of 40* coming in quick time against Buckinghamshire U17's. In addition to this she took 18 wickets, with best figures of 4-12. Lucy's capability to change matches was displayed in her spell of 3 wickets for only 2 runs, taking the T20 match against Wales from a precarious 67-2 to 71-6 in the space of her 3 overs. Middlesex's Women's Development team going on to win the game comfortably. Her selection for the Eastern Sunrisers Regional Development Centre for the 2020 season is just reward for her continuing development.

Jack Robertson Award: Josh DeCaires 157*

The highest score by a Youth Cricketer in 2019 came ironically in 2nd XI cricket. Middlesex 2nd XI played a combined Kent/Sussex 2nd XI at the start of last summer and it was during this 3 day fixture that Josh scored 157*, opening the batting in tricky conditions against a very good attack. He showed patience and awareness beyond his years in what was an outstanding knock.

David Newton Batting Award: Josh DeCaires

Josh has had a very good 2019 season, Josh played across the U17, U19 and 2nd XI teams throughout the summer. Josh scored well over 400 Youth runs but it was his performances in 2nd XI cricket that really caught the eye. His summer started with a very good 157* against a combined Kent/Sussex 2nd XI and he continued through the year scoring over 400 runs in the 2nd XI which included

2 hundreds. Josh's summer was capped off with selection into the London and East U17 side for the National Super 4's competition at Loughborough.

John Piddington Allrounder Award: Riva Pindoria

In 2019 her off spin claimed 21 wickets at an average of 11.38 and economy of only 3.32; with 7 of these coming when representing Middlesex U17 Girls at the age of only 13!! With the bat she regularly contributed, taking on a number of different roles throughout the season. Often Captaining the Middlesex U13 Girls, continually developing her ability as a leader and her awareness of the game. Going in to 2020 her potential is being supported through the Middlesex skill set programme; being part of both the Spin bowling and Batting groups.

Gerry Lillee Bowling Award: Ishaan Kaushal

Ishaan burst back into county Youth Cricket in 2019, having had a year out in 2018. Ishaan took 27 wickets across U17 and U19 matches at an average of 18. His consistency of hitting an uncomfortable length was the basis of his success and has been rewarded, following his summer performances, with selection onto the Elite Player Group (Academy) for the 2019/2020 season.

Rynhold Family Award (wicketkeeper or fielder): Matt McGowen

Matt McGowen was the outstanding choice for his wicketkeeping season in the U14's. Matt took 22 catches and 14 stumpings in last years U14 County fixtures; this to go with 482 runs meant he was a very consistent performer and influencer in the outcome of matches throughout his teams summer. Matt is quiet, determined and goes about his business in a very team orientated manner. He reads the game very well for a player of his age and has been rewarded with selection onto the Elite Player Group (Academy) for 2019/2020.

Richard Davis Award: Katie Wolfe

Katie's 2019 season saw her gain a number of plaudits, taking home the Club's Women's Youth Player of the Season in the process. Despite being only 18 Katie became one of the Women's 1st teams most reliable bowlers, taking 22 wickets across the 50 over and T20 formats. Match changing contributions were a regular feature for Katie, whether with the bat in the lower order - her 19 off 18 balls against Berkshire taking momentum into a successful run defence, and a 45 run 11th wicket stand with Sophia Dunkley against Wales - or with the ball. Her best figures of 3-12 against Berkshire and 3-16 against Sussex were surpassed by the manner in which she completed her 3 wicket haul against Somerset - all in the space of 3 deliveries!! This hat trick earning Katie the Richard Davis award.
