When Glen invited me to write an article for Seaxe news his 'brief' to me was rather vague, 'just write whatever comes into your head' Being relatively new to Middlesex and Seaxe this probably wasn't wise and a better course of action would be to look at previous Seaxe News. I read with interest Angus' article on what format the County Championship (CC) should take and the various pro's and con's for two Divisions versus a conference structure. Perhaps of little surprise to many readers this same question is currently the 'hot topic' between the First Class Counties (FCC's) and the ECB.

It seems clear that the CC will return to a two divisional structure with 10 counties in Div 1 and 8 in Div 2. When this happens, how it's decided which county is in which division and then ultimately how many teams are relegated and promoted are still the sources of considerable debate. My personal view (stress personal view) is that the conference structure is likely to continue for the 2022 season and a return to 2 divisions for the 2023 season.

Whatever the format for the CC the draft schedule for next summer looks to offer a significant improvement over 2021. It's well understood that the majority of Middlesex members want to see as much CC cricket as possible, at Lord's, in the peak summer months. The challenge over recent years and now with the advent of the 100 has been squaring the last two points; peak summer at Lord's! 2022 does have some cause for cautious optimism, it's likely there will be 2 or 3 rounds of CC cricket in July/early August. The Blast will be played in one continuous block with Finals Day pencilled in for the end of July. This is still a draft schedule but should represent a significant improvement for most members in 2022. The ECB have committed to a more thorough detailed review of the structure with the FCC this winter and hopefully further progress will be made for future years.

I mentioned Angus earlier and as many of you know he has moved to a new role at the Club. Since I joined the Club earlier in the year, Angus has been an incredible support and really helped me understand the culture and considerable heritage of Middlesex and the Seaxe Club. Angus' new role will see him taking a leading role in developing our Elite and Academy training facilities for both the men's and women's teams. He will also be growing our relationships with Clubs, Leagues, National Counties (Bucks, Berks and Herts), working with our sponsors and partners, and ex-players. Importantly he will work closely with me on ensuring the Head Coaches have the players contracted they need to deliver on field success, be that through developing home grown talent, at the heart of what Seaxe is about or where necessary bringing in external talent to the Club from home and abroad.

It's the home grown talent that I'd like to conclude with. I was lucky enough to join the Seaxe awards a few weeks ago, in a semi covid restricted environment. Looking at the names on the trophies and then at the current men's 1st XI (quarantined at the end of the room) they were almost all present. In this case, young men who had won awards supported by Seaxe over the years now at the pinnacle of Middlesex cricket. It made me not just excited for that group who clearly have a tight bond having grown up playing together, but also for the younger players receiving awards on the night, knowing that if they continue with their dedication (and that of their parents!) then the probability is they will make it too. Hopefully covid restrictions will be behind us next year and we can have a more interactive event. Let's also have the event on a day when the women's and girls teams can have a greater presence and make a truly united Seaxe event.

Our Club within a Club was something I couldn't initially get my head around, but now I understand it a bit better and have met some of the inspiring people that

drive it forwards I know that the we are very fortunate to have the Seaxe Club and I hope it continues to go from strength to strength.

I look forward to meeting more Seaxe members over the winter and next summer at various events and games. Once again thank you for everything you do for our Club(s) and in particular the young people who benefit from your kindness, wisdom and generosity.

A PRESENTATION TO STEVEN FINN AND JAMES HARRIS

At lunch on day two of the Middlesex match against Worcestershire, a presentation was made to Steven Finn and James Harris in front of the Pavilion, to acknowledge their outstanding careers with the Club.

Chairman Mike O'Farrell and President Mike Selvey presented both players with a framed collage of their most memorable moments as Middlesex players, ahead of Finn's departure to Sussex and Harris's departure to Glamorgan.

Prior to the presentation being made, the following announcement was read out over the in-ground PA system...

"Steven Finn is the first Middlesex cricketer to move through the Club's entire player pathway.

"Steven was 16 and on Middlesex's Academy when he made his first-class debut in 2005 and during the following four years his hard work and determination allowed him to develop into a bowler that was opening the bowling for England.

"During Steven's Test career he played a prominent role in England winning three Ashes series; he also performed at both 50 over and T20 World Cups.

"At a personal level his highlights in Test cricket would have been two six wicket hauls against Australia in Perth and Edgbaston. In ODI cricket his best performance was a five-wicket haul, which included a hat-trick, against Australia in 2015. Steven has taken more wickets for England than any other Middlesex bowler.

"With Middlesex he has helped the Club win the T20 Cup in 2008, Division Two of the County Championship in 2011 and the County Championship in 2016. His 16 year career has seen him play more than 260 games and take 587 wickets, with his finest performance being 9-37 against Worcestershire in 2010!

"In nine seasons with Middlesex James Harris took 316 wickets and scored almost 2500 runs. With the ball his highlight being a nine wicket haul against Durham in 2015.

"With the bat, a defiant unbeaten 41 against Lancashire in 2014 that kept the Club in Division 1, a superb 78 against Somerset in 2016 that set up a remarkable victory were the equal of his hundred against Lancashire in a Lord's RL50 Quarter Final.

"James is a respected figure in County cricket, resulting in him becoming Chair of the PCA.

Steven and James have been an enormous credit to themselves and their families, and we are proud to have had them represent the great Club that is Middlesex CCC"

On behalf of the Seaxe Club, I have thanked them both and wished them every success in their new ventures.

STEVEN FINN

Steven Thomas Finn was born in Watford, Hertfordshire on 4th April 1989. He is a tall right-arm fast bowler and right-handed batsman who graduated from the Middlesex Academy. He became the youngest first-class debutant for Middlesex versus Cambridge UCCE at Fenner's in June 2005. At 16 years and 58 days, he broke the existing record of 16 years and 152 days, which had been held by F J Titmus since 1949.

A popular cricketer throughout his career, he was awarded his county cap in 2009.

He represented England in 36 Tests (2009/10-2016/17), taking 125 wickets at an average of 30.40. His versatility was proved across the various formats, as he also took 102 wickets in 69 ODIs (2010/11-2017) and 27 wickets in 21 T20 internationals (2011-2015).

We wish him well as he continues his career with Sussex during the 2022 season.

Ask any player, and some of their most enjoyable times would be spent in Murts' corner of the dressing room enjoying a beer, reflecting after a hard fought 4 day win, before, whilst still in whites, heading down to the 'Bowlers Bar' to enjoy a drink with some of the supporters. Ideally all before lunch so that you could enjoy the biggest meal imaginable. They are the real great days.



That just leaves me to say a massive James Harris

thank you. To everyone involved with this great club. It has been an honour and a massive privilege to call Middlesex home for the past 9 seasons. As a sportsman you very rarely get to bow out on your own terms but this seems as positive as any I could think of. I've still got a few years in the tank to come and I very much hope to be back in the away dressing room at Lord's over the next few years. Thank you all for your support and I wish you all well.
