REPORT FROM ANGUS FRASER

Whilst contemplating which of the two County Championship formats – Two Division or Conference – would best serve domestic cricket my mind wondered into how we actually judge or should judge the health of cricket in England. To many it will be the performance of the England side that gives the ultimate reflection. For others it would be the number of people participating in or following the game.

Since around 2000 most decisions on the structure and fixtures of domestic cricket have been made with the performance of the England team at heart, and the results have been extremely positive. A survey of England results

shows that the teams win ratio has increased considerably since 2000. And these performances culminated in England unforgettably winning the World Cup in 2019.

From this everything should be fine in the game but unfortunately this is not the case. Although there have been many positive stories on the number of people playing cricket during the coronavirus pandemic, the figures on participation and people with an interest in the game have been concerning. And it is these figures that have led to the creation of The Hundred, a tournament that has and will no doubt continue to receive a lot of criticism from followers of county cricket. It is, however, a tournament the English game needs to succeed.

Of equal if not greater importance are the All Stars and Dynamos cricket programmes the ECB have unrolled. Nothing can be more important for cricket than inspiring the next generation of participators and followers because without them the game would come to an abrupt and sad end. The ECB will be hoping The Hundred will encourage youngsters and their parents to give cricket a go and that is where the All Stars and Dynamos cricket programmes come in.

These programmes rely on support from all sorts of areas, so it is brilliant to see the contributions the Seaxe Club have and continue to make. This is just another example of the fantastic support the Seaxe Club continues to give the game of cricket. We, as the professional side of the game, have received support in the form of contributions to young players, career enhancing trips to the other side of the world, and it is lovely to see even younger cricketers getting opportunities even earlier in their careers.

Middlesex's teams are having a challenging time at present and watching the 1st XI can be quite a stressful experience, but nothing does more to lift the spirits than watching young people enjoying playing and being involved in this wonderful game. Seaxe, thank you for the role you play in allowing this to happen.

People who live in the same area but they had never interacted with. It continues to amaze me how the power of sport brings people together. The parents were incredibly grateful to Seaxe for providing the bursary's for their children to take part in the programme.

BEHIND THE SCENES WITH SHARON EYERS

I have been in Middlesex now for seven years as a Cricket Participation Manager and have had many roles during that time. I joined Middlesex from a long 19-year career in Surrey and it soon became very apparent how different these two Counties are and how much more we have to think outside the box for delivery in Middlesex. Middlesex is home to over four million people so the scope for development is huge, however the ongoing challenge is the lack of traditional cricket settings, with many Boroughs having no traditional clubs or very few. Travel is so difficult in the city so not as easy to host a

course or an event in an evening as it can take up to one

and a half hours to travel just 3-5 miles and that is tough after a long day at work. Over the last four years I have been so happy to lead on the National Programmes

of All Stars Cricket and Dynamos which is ECB's National Programme. All Stars is for 5-8 year olds and aimed at giving young people a first great experience of cricket and Dynamos is aimed at 9-11 year olds and partnered to The Hundred where young children will learn skills and play Countdown cricket (60 balls) and emulate their male and female heroes from this summer's competition. In year one it became very apparent that many children could not attend this programme due to two very key areas:

- 1. Lack of traditional cricket clubs across Middlesex
- 2. Finances Many young people in London do not have the funds to sign up for the programme

Katie Berry, Director of Participation and the Seaxe Club worked up a plan to start a fund to offer bursaries to many young people enabling them to access cricket and enjoy a sport that many of us take for granted. Four years later the funding The Seaxe club has given us has allowed us to access other funding and grow our bursary programme, which is needed more than ever after Covid-19 as many more families across London are living below the poverty line.

With National Programmes being headed up by my colleague Pete Jones now, I will be focussing on Women and Girls Cricket working towards making our sport gender balanced and ensuring that clubs have a genuine offer. The women's and girls game has grown in recent years with huge investment into the game. We have eight centres across the Country with full time contracted female players now backed up by performance squads in each County. This is great news and will raise the profile, however we still have our challenges at grass roots cricket with only 8% of coaches being female and far less than being officials and volunteers in clubs. Female volunteers and coaches are crucial in the development of the game as young girls need to see themselves in what they can aspire to. I am looking forward to the challenge of raising our numbers all through the pathway from All Stars to England and increasing female role models across all facets of the game.

DISABILITY SEASON REVIEW

This season has been a challenging time for a lot of the county teams across the country, and Middlesex is no exception, but we have tried our hardest to ensure that we bring as much normality into the county season. At this point in time we have had 3 games cancelled for bad weather and 1 rescheduled for later in the year.

1st XI squad

The first XI squad have played 4 games, we have won 2 and lost 1 with the 4th game abandoned due to a flooded pitch; this has meant that half way through the season we are top of the league, but others have a couple of games in hand so we will have a better picture when all teams are on the same amount of played games.

2nd XI squad

The second XI squad have played 4 games, we have won 1, lost 2 and had one abandoned for bad weather. This league hasn't had a lot of games rescheduled so all teams have played the same number of games and we are currently 2nd in the league table

Super 9s

The super 9s have played 3 games and have won 1, lost 1 and had 1 abandoned. This league is probably the closest league we are involved in this season with only 1 win being the difference between top and bottom of the league; we have a game in hand over the team above us, that if we can win will put us 2nd and only one point from the top of the league with only two games remaining.

Overall

This season has seen players across all three squads really step up and perform at a very high level, we have seen two bowlers take 5 wicket hauls in games this season, we have seen players reaching batting milestones with 6 players reaching new high scores for the county, this season has also seen 8 new players join the county and make their debut, and the biggest thing amongst them is the average age of those players is 16/17 so really looks good for the future of the county program.

CRICKET SUPPORTERS' ASSOCIATION SURVEY

I've recently received the results of a survey conducted by the Cricket Supporters' Association which makes for interesting reading. The survey was completed by over 3000 people of all ages.

The Hundred:

63% of cricket fans feel negatively about the Hundred with only 20% showing a positive response. It was the younger fans who were keener on the format with 37% of 16-24 year olds being positive with a further 33% undecided.

50% of cricket fans believe the Hundred will impact on the existing County structure.

County cricket:

98% of cricket fans think the County Championship is the breeding ground for future England Test players

94% of cricket fans think the lack of priority for County Championship will impact Test cricket.

Coverage:

93% of cricket fans would like to see all ICC Tournaments have some element of free to air, either TV (Channel 4 was the most popular), or online.

68% believe that cricket still needs the revenue from the likes of Sky TV.

Finally:

Only 22% of cricket fans believe the ECB considers fans when making decisions! I don't think there is anything too startling by way of revelations in this survey, in the ECB's drive to attract younger players by introducing the Hundred, they have alienated a large proportion of the older supporter. I believe the Vitality Blast, IPL etc., has already attracted a younger audience; maybe if more County and Test cricket was shown on free to air, it's very possible even more youngsters would be attracted to all the formats of this wonderful game.
